

Your ability to get out depends on advance warning from smoke alarms and advance planning. Here are some safety tips from the National Fire Protection Association (www.nfpa.org).


- Pull together everyone in your household and make a plan. Walk through your home and inspect all possible exits and escape routes.
- Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home.
- Choose an outside meeting place (e.g., neighbor's house, a light post, mailbox, or stop sign) a safe distance in front of your home where everyone can meet after they've escaped.
- Make sure that someone is assigned to assist children, older adults, and others with special needs.

Putting your plan to the test

- Practice your home fire escape plan twice a year, making the drill as realistic as possible.
- Allow children to master escape planning before holding a fire drill at night when they are sleeping. The objective is to practice, not to frighten, so telling children there can be as effective as a surprise drill.

- If your home has two floors, every family member (including children) must be able to escape from the second floor rooms. Practice setting up the ladder from a first floor window to make sure you can do it correctly and quickly.
- Closing doors on your way out slows the spread of fire, giving you more time to safely escape.
- In some cases, smoke or fire may prevent you from exiting your home. To prepare for an emergency like this, practice "sealing yourself in." Close all doors between you and the fire. Use duct tape or towels to seal the door cracks and cover air vents to keep smoke from coming in. If possible, open your windows at the top and bottom so fresh air can get in. Call the fire department to report your exact location. Wave a flashlight or light-colored cloth at the window to let the fire department know where you are located.




It's Time to Join: Serve Your Community as a Volunteer Fire Fighter
